This past year has not gone according to plan, for any of us, and we've seen the impact this pandemic has had on the non-profit sector and volunteerism.



But we have also seen the resilience of the human spirit, and

how communities have come together to support each other during a year no one could have predicted.

for what we thought would be a short-term period,

but it was not long before we realized that the COVID-19 pandemic was going to go on longer than expected and we would have to make some permanent decisions moving forward. Thanks to the support of our funders and partners, we have been able to create opportunities out of the challenges.

In 2020-21, we moved to a complete work-from-home model and learned that we could still do almost all our work without being in the same physical space. We wrapped up the MB 150 Youth Ambassador program with an incredible showcase of each project, which we celebrated virtually. We delivered all of our training remotely and online, and discovered that participants could still be engaged and learn in this format. We went virtual with our annual volunteer awards celebration, and created a beautiful video tapestry of the recipients in their home communities, sharing their reasons for

giving back. And, after the pandemic highlighted the need for the service provided by 211 Manitoba, additional funding meant Manitobans were provided a centralized information and referral service that could be accessed from anywhere in the province by calling 2-1-1.

Our priority was pivoting our training department to online delivery. One of the most impacted programs due to the pandemic, our training department never lost focus for one moment. When we realized it was unknown how long it would be until we could offer our training in-person, we successfully converted all our in-house workshops to an online format.

Within the first month of the pandemic, we offered a series of pandemic-related webinars to support the sector and created a special section of our website dedicated to pandemic resources. By June, we were once again offering those workshops we had deferred at the start of the pandemic, only now they were online.

Though training was impacted by COVID, the amazing work of the training department meant we offered meaningful and relevant training and webinars AND our reach was widened as people from across Manitoba, and Canada, were able to participate in our courses thanks to technology.

To capitalize on this momentum in training we created a series of resources and supports in board governance, capacity building, and volunteer management. These tools are now available for purchase on our website, and have been invaluable to the sector.

Shortly after the initial onset of the COVID-19 pandemic, InterGroup Consultants Ltd. reached out to Volunteer Manitoba to get a better understanding of the needs of non-profit organizations and volunteers during the pandemic. Through facilitated online discussions over the course of four weeks in the summer of 2020, InterGroup and Volunteer Manitoba brought together volunteer administrators and volunteers from various organizations to discuss what volunteering looked like pre-pandemic and the issues and gaps that have occurred within their organizations since the start of the pandemic.

These discussions led to the creation of the Volunteering Now! Volunteerism in Manitoba during a Pandemic survey. The survey went out during the fall of 2020 and you can learn more about the results on page 9 of this report.

The pandemic has had the greatest impact on older adult volunteers, and most of these volunteers are largely concerned over the inability to return to their previous in-person volunteering. Older adults are also a vulnerable population for COVID-19 exposure. These two things combined meant a large decrease in volunteer numbers for seniors. This is not something Volunteer Manitoba has ever needed to worry about in the past, with most volunteer hours always being donated by those over 65. But again, the pandemic has changed that, and we are now working closely with several organizations to increase our support for older volunteers, and identify ways we can help them get back to the work they love doing.

Our Youth Program was also drastically impacted this past year,

and though we were not able to deliver classroom presentations or participate in community outreach, we were still able to participate in virtual events that gave us an opportunity to connect with young people about volunteering. We continued to offer our volunteer referral service online and over the phone, and we piloted a virtual student recruitment fair in the fall which was very successful and received a lot of positive feedback.

We would like to give a special thank you to Canada Life, the Winnipeg Foundation and RBC Foundation for your continued support of our youth programming.

As the pandemic continued, 211 Manitoba saw a huge spike in requests for information and that led to an injection of federal funding that allowed for the shift from a web-based service to a full-service call centre. However, housing this program under one organization's umbrella would ensure its longterm success, so the decision was made to move the program over to United Way of Winnipeg, ending the decades long partnership over 211 Manitoba. This transition also meant that we said farewell to two of our staff members, Philip Wolfart and Alanna Palmer, who moved over to the United Way and continue the work of bringing information and referrals to Manitobans. We miss them both so much, but we are thrilled to see this growth happening for both them, and 211 Manitoba.

This, and so much more was accomplished this past year, and you can read all about it in this annual report. We want to take a moment to thank our board, and the dedicated staff at Volunteer Manitoba, for the unwavering belief in the work we do. We cannot wait until we can all gather again together in person. Until then, be well.

In 1978, Volunteer Manitoba began offering information and referral to Manitobans through CONTACT Community Information. The mandate of CONTACT was to connect individuals and social service providers with the best available information to provide strong information and referral in Manitoba, and help citizens and agencies become better informed about the services that can help them.

In 2015, Volunteer Manitoba and United Way Winnipeg worked in partnership to transition the CONTACT Community Information Database into 211 Manitoba.

211 Manitoba is a searchable online database of

When the pandemic began, 211 MB saw a dramatic increase in requests for services, which led to an influx of federal funding that meant Manitobans were provided a centralized information and referral service that could be accessed from anywhere in the province by calling 2-1-1.

Thanks to increased awareness and usage, we soon came to realize that housing this program under one organization's umbrella would ensure its long-term success, so the decision was made to move the program over to United Way of Winnipeg, ending the partnership over 211 Manitoba.

Two long term staff members who were dedicated solely to the management of the information in the 211 Manitoba database moved over to the United Way of Winnipeg.

We would like to thank Philip Wolfart and Alanna Palmer for their years of service at Volunteer Manitoba, and for their dedication and commitment to providing valuable, relevant, and important information to people across Manitoba during their time with us. We wish them all the best as they continue their work over at the United Way of Winnipeg.

VOLUNTEERISM and COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Volunteering is a powerful force for good and the number of people who donate their time here in Manitoba, is incredible. To put it in perspective, one out of every two people in the province volunteer their time. Though, what is truly amazing about Manitoba's volunteers is how those hours are spent. All things from coaching youth, feeding houseless individuals, visiting the sick, cleaning up parks, teaching literacy, sitting on boards and committees, running festivals, to maintaining frontline services.

As the only volunteer centre in our province, it is our job to foster and develop volunteerism in the community for the 7000 non-profits and charities in Manitoba.

For over 40 years, Volunteer Manitoba has promoted and celebrated volunteers and volunteerism across the province. We do this by encouraging people to volunteer their time through community outreach and referring fitting volunteer opportunities to individuals. We also work with groups and organizations to help enhance and promote their recruitment of volunteers through outreach, social media, and the Winnipeg Free Press.

Our team loves the work we do as we know volunteering opens many opportunities to connect with your community, explore career options, share your passion with others and create change in the world.

Every year, over 24 million Canadians contributed approximately 5 billion volunteer hours and here in Manitoba we have the second highest rate of volunteerism in Canada at 44%.


To help connect individuals looking for volunteer opportunities, we developed a volunteer referral service to recommend available positions with organizations that best suite volunteers needs and interest.

Presented by the Winnipeg Foundation, Board Connect is an avenue for boards and standing committees to recruit engaged and motivated individuals to help serve the non-profit sector.

The Board Connect program aims to achieve the following outcomes;

- Provide participants with the opportunity to expand their skills and contribute leadership to a community organization.
- Engage the next generation of leaders to ensure continuous capacity building and long-term sustainability.
- Create a network of talented and resourceful emerging leaders who will establish strong and lasting relationships that are personally and professionally beneficial.
- Connect non-profit leaders with professionals who have the skills, experience and social capital to help them be successful.
- Serve the community's need for effective, highly skilled, and energized leadership.
- Increase awareness of non-profit agencies and develop a sustained commitment among emerging leaders to their communities.

For over a decade, The Winnipeg Chamber of Commerce and Volunteer Manitoba have partnered together to offer Leadership Winnipeg,

a 10-session leadership program (plus class project), which runs from September through June. The program provides experiences that inspire and help individuals to develop an understanding of themselves, their community and their role within it. The day-long sessions, held once a month, are hosted in the community and focuses on a theme. The sessions include tours and guest speakers, plus an opportunity to interact with those speakers. The program is primarily learning by experiencing as opposed to textbook-based learning. A portion of the day is also devoted to leadership development – providing the tools that will enhance the participant's communication, facilitation, collaboration and time management skills.



At Volunteer Manitoba, we recognize that regardless of the number of volunteers, there is a person at each organization, charity or community group whose job it is to recruit, supervise, support and recognize volunteers.

To support the work being done by Volunteer Administrators in Manitoba, we created a networking group, developed a series of resources (available through our website), and established a Volunteer Management Advisory Committee.

TRAINING

Throughout the year, Volunteer Manitoba delivers effective, relevant and engaging training for boards, staff and volunteers. Our training is designed to help increase skills, build confidence, and provide opportunities to network with others in the non-profit sector.

Leveraging a network of facilitators across the province, and increasing our reach by using technology to offer our workshops online, our <u>training</u> helps those working in our sector come up with new ideas, understand best practices, and access the tools and resources needed to build capacity.

Training Highlights from 2020-21

Pandemic Specific Training

This year, our team developed pandemic-specific webinars and saw participants attend from across Canada, the US, and Europe.

Topics included were:

- Pandemic Planning
- HR Pandemic Essentials
- Managing Virtual Meetings and AGMs
- Getting the Word Out Using Social Media
- Volunteer Screening During Times of Urgency
- Wellness for Service Providers (a partnership with the Canadian Mental Health Association)

Volunteer Management Hybrid Conference

In October, we hosted The Future is Now, a volunteer management conference presented by AL!VE, Better Impact, and Volunteer Management Professionals of Canada. In its fifth year, this year's topic explored how leaders of volunteers can shift from managing to leading.

This streaming event consisted of a keynote presentation followed by a moderated discussion with other presenters and a Q&A with the audience. As the host site for the conference, Volunteer Manitoba facilitated discussions around each topic to connect volunteer administrators in Manitoba.

VM's Emerging Leaders Program

To help support the sector prepare for a post-pandemic world, Volunteer Manitoba has created the Emerging Leaders Program to help develop the skills, the adaptability and the resilience of non-profit staff who are leading a team or a program.

In the non-profit sector, organizations are figuring out how they can adapt their programs and services to rapidly changing conditions, and also how to make sure their staff are ready for these new roles and activities. We know that this is bigger than being able to work from home, or the role that technology can play to help us achieve our missions. Leaders of non-profits need to invest in the professional development of their workforces in order to continue delivering programs and services in the post-pandemic era.

Management Fundamentals

Because the Manitoba Federation of Non-Profit Organizations closed, we thought offering the Management Fundamentals training would be a helpful substitute for non-profits. The course is designed to provide HR management knowledge and skills by sharing the foundations to hire, develop, and supervise non-profit staff all in accordance with Manitoban employment and safety legislation.

Volunteer Management Webinars – Take your Volunteer Program to the Next Level

In partnership with Recreation Connections, we offered a series of six webinars on volunteer management. These webinars covered the following topics; how to say no to a volunteer, creating job descriptions, volunteer intake (application forms, interviews and reference checks), recruitment strategies, and how to create connections to build retention.

New Supports and Resources

We also supported non-profits across Manitoba by developing a series of online resources that are available for free, or for a small fee. These board governance, volunteer management and capacity building resources are available on our website.

We have also developed a distance Board Governance course, to help those who are looking to learn more on the subject.



Whether they were able to continue to volunteer in person, or if they made the shift to working virtually, all of our volunteers deserve to be recognized for their exceptional show of solidarity and their commitment to the groups, charities, and non-profit organizations in our province.

Together with Manitoba Liquor and Lotteries, we honour these volunteer contributions through the Annual Volunteer Awards celebration!

This year we received a record number of nominations for the volunteer award proving that in spite of a pandemic, Manitobans are passionate about the well-being of their communities and committed to helping their fellow neighbours. 
VOLUNTEER REFERRALS FOR YOUTH

STUDENT RECRUITMENT FAIRS

For the past 11 years, our organization hosted the annual Student Recruitment Fairs at post-secondary institutions across Manitoba. Non-profit organizations, charities, and community groups join us on campus for a day of volunteer recruitment from each student body. The SR Fairs are an excellent way for students to connect with organizations who are actively recruiting and to gain valuable experience for their future careers.

This year, we piloted a virtual Student Recruitment Fair with University of Manitoba's Career Services and Asper School of Business. We had 128 students and 18 non-profits attend virtually. As a result, non-profits and student alike greatly enjoyed our event and would like to see more virtual volunteer fairs in the future!

YOUTH OUTREACH

Throughout the year, our team regularly participates in community events across the province. Though COVID-19 impacted our physical attendance, we were still able to virtually visit classrooms, community groups, and organizations. During these "visits" we delivered engaging presentations designed to motivate and assist youth in their volunteer efforts.

In 2020-21, Volunteer Manitoba participated in eight community outreach events, including Brandon's annual career fair, the Youth Agencies Alliance Conference, Career Trek's Empowering Change Conference, Menno Simons College Social Justice Fair. Let's Get to Work Conference and Youth in Philanthropy Conference. In total, staff delivered 17 presentations to high schools and post secondaries schools in Manitoba.
